First Baptist Family,

The initial adrenaline all of us had at the beginning of this pandemic is now gone. This has turned into a tough slog. We're weary and worn out. People wonder how much longer this is going to take and when things are going to be able to return to normal. And unfortunately, I don't have the answers to those questions any more than you do. All of the stress this disruption has brought has caused people to act in ways they normally wouldn't. Things just feel off-kilter. I've sat in on numerous Zoom calls with clergy groups over the last few months both to get ideas during this time in which we're apart and for my own personal self-care. As I've listened to friends and colleagues share their experiences, I've been both shocked and thankful. I've been shocked to hear an increasing number of friends openly contemplate leaving the ministry and leaving the church altogether. These are people I know to be excellent ministers, people who are good at what they do, thoughtful, kind, faithful Christians, you name it. They're contemplating such drastic life changes because of how polarized their churches are right now because of the pandemic. Church members at these places have not just disagreed with one another respectfully; they've acted out of character, issued ultimatums, and have left burning bridges and burning their ministers on the way out the door. My friends are tired of the fighting and the blame they've received over things they can't control. This is an especially difficult time to do ministry. It's easy to get discouraged. In addition to feeling shocked, though, I've also felt thankful. I've felt thankful because my experience here has been so different. I've felt thankful for all of you, how supportive you've been, how encouraging you've been to me and all the staff. I've also been thankful that we've been able to disagree respectfully with one another. Tragically, that is becoming a lost art. Like me, I know all of you have opinions concerning this pandemic, and I know some of you wish we were handling things differently as a congregation. I get that. Because we're in uncharted territory, this whole ordeal feels like trying to build a plane mid-flight and praying it doesn't crash. There are going to be some understandable differences of opinion in how to put the plane together. I'm thankful, though, that we all share the same goal and have the same desire – for the church to succeed, grow, and come out stronger on the other side of this virus. And I am immensely thankful that people haven't been issuing ultimatums, burning bridges, or burning our ministerial staff. We have

stayed united as a congregation, in large part I think, because we've been praying together.

I read an article about clergy burnout during this pandemic a few days ago. The author made several excellent points, but there was one particular quote that stuck out. She wrote, "Honest to God, I've never seen clergy so uniformly depressed, hopeless and feeling so unsupported. Multiple friends are making plans to leave parishes, despite not knowing where they will go. And I think I know the biggest reason why. We've turned church away from a place dedicated to creating disciples to a place for consumers. We've led those who attend to believe that the church is a place for them to get their desires met, not a place for them to hear the Gospel, bear one another's burdens, and serve." The author's solution to this problem was for people to pray. Specifically, she encouraged people to pray before they complain. That's great advice! We have been praying together since the beginning of August. Every Sunday we've prayed for a united spirit and a bold faith. And in the month of October, we're going to begin praying for missionaries that are connected to the church. We're also going to pray for teachers, students, and each public school in Bristol, Tennessee and Bristol, Virginia by name (clergy are far from the only ones suffering from burnout, so are teachers, students, and their families along with many others). We're going to continue to pray and I'm convinced that we're going to stay united as a congregation as we do. You're also going to have the opportunity to serve as well. Soon, we're going to be nominating people to serve as deacons. Our Ministry Team is going to start approaching people to serve on the various teams and committees of the church. What makes the church the church is people worshiping together, serving together, and doing life together under the Lordship of Jesus Christ. And what makes First Baptist Bristol First Baptist Bristol is the people here who choose to do those things together. I want to encourage you to keep up the good work. Keep praying. Keep serving. Keep worshiping. Keep bearing the burdens of one another and extending grace and mercy to one another, especially right now. God knows, we all need it. Keep remembering that our goals are the same and that we're all doing this under the Lordship of Jesus Christ. Because if we do, I'm convinced that we'll not only grow spiritually but that we'll grow numerically as well.
